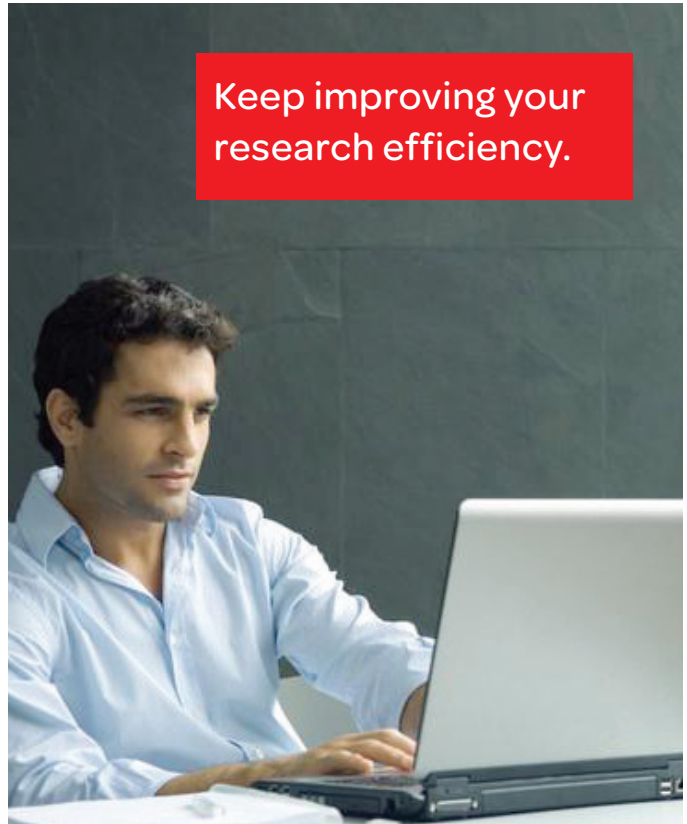

ASPIRE

For many of you, public service work is either your primary goal, or allows you to make a difference while gaining experience. We are aware of the challenges you face, and for this reason provide a longer period of access to Lexis Advance with a unique ASPIRE ID.

Review the eligibility requirements, below, and if your non-profit employment qualifies, use the Graduate Program form to apply for an ASPIRE ID. You will need to provide verifying documentation.

ELIGIBILITY:

- Graduates must work directly for a non-profit or charitable organization*
- Access continues throughout public interest employment until September 1, 2014

EXCLUSIONS:

- Government work (even if unpaid)*
- Work for a law firm (even if it represents a non-profit organization)
- Solo practice (even if it encompasses non-profit work)
- Pro bono work that is neither non-profit nor charitable in nature

*Government work such as working for a district attorney's office or public defender's office; administrative agencies; or clerking for a judge is excluded because these entities are not 501(c)(3) organizations. A 501(c)(3) organization is defined as one that is organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, testing for public safety, literary, or educational purposes.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

Spring 2013 graduates (including December 2012 graduates) who qualify are:

- Deferred fall associates engaged in verifiable public interest work
- 2013 graduates engaged in verifiable public interest work while searching for employment
- 2013 graduates engaged in verifiable public interest work as a continuing profession

Graduates who fall into one of the exclusions can simply apply for the Law School Graduate Program, rather than the ASPIRE ID.

WHAT TO EXPECT:

Within two weeks of submitting your ASPIRE registration you will get an email whether or not your eligibility and documentation meet the requirements. If your eligibility is confirmed, you will receive an ID and Password for ASPIRE access to Lexis Advance in early July.
